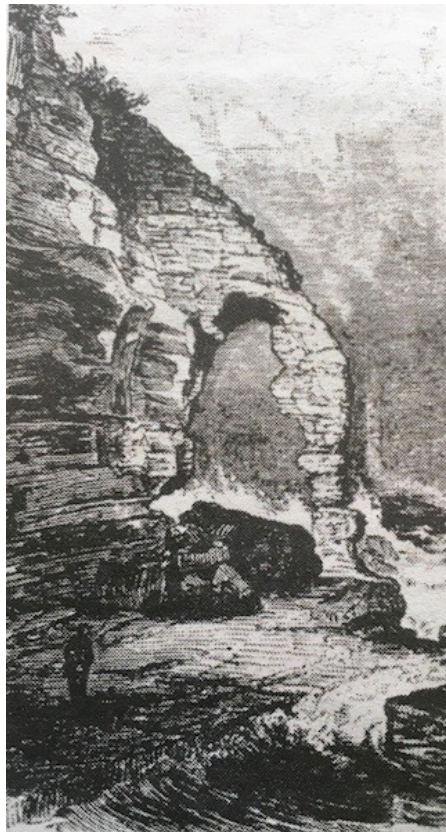


A copy of the etching of the Avalon Hole in the Wall which dates to around the mid 1800s. This feature was frequently and mistakenly referred to as St Michaels Arch; St Michaels cave is a few hundred metres north of the Hole in the Wall.



A (glass plate) photo thought to have been taken in the late 1800s or very early 1900s. it shows the column left when the top of the arch fell in. Looking at the first image, it's possible to imagine that once the arch collapsed it left the "Indians" nose on the headland...the remaining part of the arch.
